This year's meet started with ice hockey in December 2012. Over the past 9 months, exciting competitions were held in 31 sporting events. My hope for you would be that you too learn many things through sports. I hope this Seven Universities Meet has been a place not only for excelling in competition, but also for deepening friendship, learning from sports. I hope these meets will always remain a place for such purposes.

Seven years from now some of you may be skilled athletes. I wonder if one of you might be in the Olympics one day. Next year's meet will be hosted by Kyoto University. It will surely be an exciting meet. I look forward to seeing you again in Kyoto, crowded with people for the Gion Festival.
